
Membership, Kathie Burnette - said we are up to 125 members.


Show and Tell: Loved the interesting and beautiful pieces that everyone had to share!!

If you read the Constitution for the Canaveral Mineral & Gem Society, Article 2 states we are specifically "For the preservation, support and promotion of the hobby of Mineralogy and its various forms of allied activities and Earth Sciences." This is further defined for "...exchange of knowledge, experience and other helpful information..." and "...education of members...". We have never been associated with use for profit or commercialism.

The primary purpose of our shop is to have volunteers teach other members aspects of the hobby. Shop open hours are based around that and are for members to practice what they have learned. It is not for the use by members for their own personal gain.

The shop is NOT for use by members as a professional workshop. Our usage fees are based upon the shop being used by hobbyists and not production work. We have purposefully kept the fees for shop time, classes, and materials available at the shop as low as possible but to still be high enough to maintain the wear and tear on the machines. They are not high enough to pay for the wear and tear of production use.

Your Club Needs You

It is time for the Parade of Gems again. This is the only real source of income our club has. What we realize from the show must supply all the money to keep us going for another year. Do you have a few hours to give back to the club to help us make it a success? No skills needed at all. Many of the jobs are sit down so mobility is not an issue.

NO SCRATCH VISE JAWS

If your bench vise has replaceable jaws, there is a simple modification to customize it for bending sheet metal and holding jewelry pieces without worrying about the jaws leaving scratch marks.

I make a duplicate set of jaws from high density plastic such as Nylon or Delrin. Remove the jaws and use them as a template. Cut two pieces from a 1/2 inch sheet of scrap plastic. Then clamp the steel jaw over the plastic and drill through the steel side and into the plastic.

Finally, use a larger drill to countersink the plastic for the screw heads.

Plastic can be obtained from the scrap bin at a local plastics store, can be purchased online from Ebay, or can be repurposed from an old kitchen cutting board.

Mineral Of The Month – Corundum By Dave Jacobson

This month we will take at corundum,, Al2O3, aluminum oxide. Two of the more famous gemstones are varieties corundum. Ruby is the red variety. All other colored gem grade material is sapphire. It is not until about 1800 that ruby and sapphire were recognized as corundum. Prior to that red spinel and garnet were also considered ruby. Some non-gem grade material is called emery is used as an abrasive. Some associated minerals are calcite, zoisite, feldspars, micas and garnet. Corundum is found in many locations in the word such as Burma; Sri lanka, Tanzania and other African localities; India; the Middle East and Southeast Asia.

Corundum is found in a variety of deposits such as metamorphic rock, pegamatites and nepheline syenites. The rock is typically lacking or poor in silicon oxide, which if present would combine to form another mineral. Corundum is also found in alluvial deposits. Many of the facet grade ruby's and sapphires are mined in alluvial deposits.

Corundum is the second hardest mineral on the Mohs scale, although diamond the hardest mineral is four times harder than corundum. This due to the strong and short oxgen-aluminum bonds which pull the oxgen and aluminum atoms close together. This makes a tightly bonded structure that results in a hard, dense mineral.

Corundum is in the trigonal crystal system. The crystals are typically tapered hexagonal prisms. They are often tabular. The crystal ends are frequently marked with triangular striations. Colors are as follows: Ruby is intense red due to chromium. Blue sapphire is due to iron and titanium trace elements. Colors other than blue are called fancy sapphires. Paprdasha is orange due to chromium plus ferric iron. Alexandritelike is due to vanadium. Yellow due to ferric iron (or defects). Green due to ferrous plus ferric iron (and defects). Colorless is pure, no trace elements. Hardness is 9. Specific gravity is 3.9 to 4.1. Streak is white.

Corundum takes it's name from the Tamil word *kuruntam* which is derived from the Sanskrit *kuruvinda* meaning "ruby".


